
CONSTELLATIONS IN LITERATURE

Homer in his two epics, the Iliad and the Odyssey, contains some stars and constellations, while he also describes the starry sky.



. Lets see at some Homeric references to the constellations, stars, and planet Venus, as recorded in the Iliad and the Odyssey.

HOMER'S ILIAD

In the Iliad, rhapsody S (481-488) describes the shield of Achilles, which was made by Hephaestus, at the request of Thetis, the mother of Achilles.



ACHILLES SHIELD

All the constellations were imprinted on the shield

Book 18 (481-488)

"Therein he wrought the earth, therein the heavens therein the sea, and the unwearied sun, and the moon at the full, [485] and therein all the constellations wherewith heaven is crowned—the Pleiades, and the Hyades and the mighty Orion, and the Bear, that men call also the Wain, that circleth ever in her place, and watcheth Orion, and alone hath no part in the baths of Ocean."

22 (25-30)



" Him the old man Priam was first to behold with his eyes, as he sped all-gleaming over the plain, like to the star that cometh forth HOMER'S ILIAD BOOK at harvest-time, and brightly do his rays shine amid the host of stars in the darkness of night, the star that men call by name the Dog of Orion. [30] Brightest of all is he, yet withal is he a sign of evil, and bringeth much fever upon wretched mortals.
